# 1 Welcome, Introductions, Attendance & Apologies

- 1.1 The meeting started at 6:00 PM and a quorum of 4 was present.
- 1.2 (SO): Explained the facilities and fire safety procedures for the building.
- 1.3 (SO): Announced the receipt of apologies from A. McIntosh (AM) [Vice Chair], A. Gray (AG) [Secretary], M. Ferrie (MF) [Member], M. Wilkinson (MW) [Member], M. Burke (MB) [Councillor], S. Greer (SG) [Councillor], and noted them for the record.
- 1.4 (SO): Summarised the agenda, code of conduct, and urged all in attendance to participate during the meeting.

# 2 Approval of Previous Minutes

2.1 (SO): Invited all present to review, and approve, the previous Ordinary Meeting minutes. The committee unanimously approved the Minutes of Meeting from 30 April 2024 as a true and accurate record.

#### 3 Matters Arising from Previous Minutes

3.1 **Action owner (AM):** Contact Scottish Fire and Rescue to enquire about AED and CPR training availability for residents. AM suggested Dominican Hall as a possible venue for training since no events have been held in Craigend thus far.

<u>Update 26/03/2024</u>: Potential dates in April, May, and June have been emailed to Scottish Fire and Rescue for consideration. It is proposed that only one session be held due to limited interest shown by residents. (AM) will feed back the agreed date to (AG) once a response comes in.

<u>Update 30/04/2024</u>: No response yet from Scottish Fire and rescue. (AM) will follow-up on original email.

<u>Update 28/05/2024</u>: (AM) has reached out to Scottish Fire and Rescue on two more occasions but is yet to receive a response. \*\*\* Open. \*\*\*

3.2 **Action owner (RK):** Investigate whether there is an opportunity for GCC to complete a compulsory purchase order for the vacant property at 69 Tillycairn Road for community betterment.

<u>Update 30/04/2024</u>: This has been raised with the empty property team and they are doing investigations into ownership. (RK) advised that they would then need a housing association that would be willing to take on the property but should have some more information on this for the next meeting.

<u>Update 28/05/2024</u>: The Property Team at Glasgow City Council (GCC) has contacted the owner to bring the property back into use. If the owner does not agree to this, the only route would be for GCC to initiate a legal case. Any future updates on this will be fed back to GCG CC.

\*\*\* Closed. \*\*\*

3.3 **Action owner (SO):** Ask GCC NRS to consider additional public bin installations across Gartloch Village with Blacader Drive bus stops highlighted as a priority.

<u>Update 28/05/2024</u>: GCC NRS have installed two additional bins within Garloch Village in proximity to the Blacader Drive bus stops. Three bins were previously sited at Loch Way and Loch Grove, however, once has since been removed from Loch Grove due to complaints from residents. The remainder of the bins in the area are located on the main arteries of the streets. GCC offered to do a full reassessment and place additional bins once the remainder of roads and pavements are adopted from New City Vision but is unable to place any more until such time. \*\*\* Closed. \*\*\*

# 4 Officer Updates & Reports

#### **Chair/Vice Chair**

4.1 Sevenlochs Wetlands Park has been requested to work alongside GCG CC and charitable organisations within our boundary area. They have also been invited to our future meetings and asked to provide some feedback on the Consolidated Local Consultation Report undertaken by GCG CC which was issued to them last year.

#### <u>Secretary</u>

- 4.2 Glasgow City Council Neighbourhoods Regeneration and Sustainability (GCC NRS) have provided some updates on queries from our last meeting:
  - **Littered Garden on Mossvale Road** GCC have no power to remove items from the garden of a private property unless arranged by the resident. If properties are factored by Wheatley Homes Glasgow, then this is the type of issue that can be raised to them.
  - **Communal Bins in Craigend** GCC are not responsible for the communal bin areas, only the servicing of the bins. If there are issues identified in the surrounding bin areas these should be raised with Wheatley Homes Glasgow.
  - **Dropped Waste During Refuse Collection** This should be reported via the MyGlasgow app under 'litter in a public space. Additionally, residents can contact the GCG CC detailing times/dates and locations then GCC NRS can raise for specific locations. GCC operatives should always clean any waste they cause by servicing the bins. However, GCC is not responsible for side waste left by residents in communal bin stores.
  - **Potholes Throughout Community** The Roads department will assess the locations previously identified and programme any repairs if necessary. GCC NRS emphasised that for potholes and roads issues moving forward, residents should report via the MyGlasgow app, under 'poor condition' or 'potholes'.
  - **Coxton Place Dog Fouling** GCG NRS representative (TB) visited Coxton Place and erected 'No Dog Fouling' signage and spoke with dog owners in the area regarding this issue.
  - MUGA Maintenance The MUGA adjacent to GESH has been confirmed as managed by GCC.
     (TB) attended site and noted the synthetic carpet is in relatively good condition and has been patched in two places recently. The surrounding ironwork is also in good condition. A request was raised to give the pathways surrounding the MUGA a cut back and synthetic carpet blown, this has since been undertaken.
  - Type of Traffic on Gartloch Road (Rural Section) It would be difficult to stop any vehicles from accessing a public road (i.e. JCB's and lorries). Any concerns about speeding vehicles should be reported immediately via Police Scotland. There is a current proposal to extend the 40mph speed limit in this area which may help alleviate speeding concerns, but this will not alter the type of traffic on the road.

4.5 Planning application **24/00607/FUL** (Installation of telecommunications monopole, associated cabinets, and ancillary works on Gartloch Road) has been approved despite official objection submitted by GCG CC. No other objections were submitted.

# 5 Elected Member Updates

#### Councillor R. Kelly

- 5.1 Noted the consultation for the B806 speed reduction (rural section of Gartloch Road).
- 5.2 Mossvale Path Road has been approved for complete resurfacing due to its poor condition.
- 5.3 Reiterated that proposals should be submitted for any infrastructure improvements within the boundary area for consideration under the Neighbourhood Infrastructure Improvement Fund (NIIF).
- 5.4 New resources have been sourced within GCC to coordinate all pricing for proposals during summer 2024 for existing and new items.

# 6 Police Scotland Update

- 6.1 (PF): The dog attacks discussed by residents at the previous GCG CC meeting which were witnessed on social media have now been reported officially to Police Scotland and are now under investigation.
- 6.2 (PF): Police Scotland undertook engagement with residents within Gartloch Village regarding reports of unsafe practices of contractors on site at Gartloch Hospital (e.g. unsafe parking, dangerous driving). Residents were advised specific details are required for any official investigation i.e. vehicle descriptions, driver description, vehicle registration, or any video or photographic evidence.
- 6.3 (PF): The traffic on the rural section of Gartloch Road and areas across Garthamlock and Craigend is being monitored by Police Scotland. It was noted that the rural section of Gartloch Road was complex and did not safely allow for a Police vehicle to remain stationary and monitor traffic as much as they would like. A suggestion was made by a resident for Police Scotland to use their car park on this stretch of road to allow Police Scotland to carry out the level of monitoring / enforcement required safely.
- 6.4 (PF): No traffic incidents have been reported for the rural section of Gartloch Road since the April 2024 GCG CC meeting. Only two incidents have been reported for the entirety of 2024, so residents are encouraged to report all incidents as this number is not a true reflection of the number of incidents on the road this year. If incidents are not reported, this will not allow accurate data to be captured on how many incidents occur on this road and restricts Police Scotland's involvement.
- 6.5 (PF): Any incidents of crime can be reported via 101 or it can be done through your local housing officer or Elected Member. There is also an option to report anonymously if residents wish to do so.
- 6.6 (Resident): There is a video circulating of two youths ready to fight with knives / blades in Craigend (approx. 12 14 years old). It appears that knife crime is becoming more of a problem, especially in Craigend, as more youths are carrying knives, and this is a cause for concern for other children and parents in the area. (PF) asked that any crime of this nature should be brought to the immediate attention of Police Scotland.
- 6.7 (PF): Garthamlock and Craigend had 109 reported crime incidents over the last month (various), Gartloch had 124 reported crime incidents with 11 specific to Gartloch Hospital. Marked and unmarked patrols are in operation across our entire boundary area.

#### 7 Consultations

#### B806 Gartloch Road (40mph Speed Limit) Order 2024

- 7.1 This consultation is online at https://www.glasgow.gov.uk/proposedtro and closes on 07/06/2024.
- 7.2 Attendees were encouraged to submit their endorsement / objections for the proposal prior to the deadline as speed limits on this stretch of road have been heavily discussed during previous meetings.
- 7.3 (RK): Suggested that GCG CC and Police Scotland should submit their own endorsement for the proposal based on discussions at previous meetings.

# <u>Scottish Fire and Rescue Service – 'Shaping our Future Service: You Say'</u>

#### GCG CC Consolidated Local Consultation Report 2023

- 7.5 A summary of the GCG CC Consolidated Local Consultation Report was reviewed in collaboration with GCC NRS representation to identify key stakeholders within the council, to advance items in conjunction with GCG CC and residents.
- 7.6 Progress to date and additional comments / actions were recorded against key areas of improvement within the community and noted within the summary (see **Appendix B**).
- 7.7 GCG CC will progressively address some of these items with a view of closing them over time.

### 8 Current Local Issues & Public Input

- 8.1 (SO): Most drains throughout Craigend are blocked with mud / debris. Some of these were reported last year via the MyGlasgow app and remain outstanding. (TB) advised there is a gulleys programme within GCC. The scheduled completion date for our area is September 2024.
- 8.2 (SO): The grass verges within Craigend which are adopted by GCC are overgrown. (TB) reiterated that the GCC grass cutting schedule has been reduced from ten cuts a year to seven so the time between cuts is longer leaving some areas looking overgrown.

### 9 Any Other Business (AOB)

9.1 (AMCB): The recent teacher job cuts across schools within Glasgow are cause for concern. This could be detrimental to the learning and development of children and young people within our boundary. Attendees agreed with this statement and suggested that GCC funding set aside for other items such as Active Travel (i.e. cycle lanes), which often cause a hinderance to communities, could be better spent to fund the teacher funding gap.

#### 10 Declare Date of Next Meeting & Meeting Close

- 10.1 There will be no meeting held in June 2024 due to summer recess. Therefore, the next Ordinary Meeting will be held on 30 July 2024, 6:00 PM 7:30 PM at GESH Community Centre, 1 Redcastle Square, Glasgow, G33 5EG.
